Philosophy and Purpose

LaRue Baptist Academy is a ministry of LaRue Baptist Church. Therefore, the philosophy and purpose of the academy will be in agreement with that of the church. The academy is based upon the Word of God, the King James Version of the Holy Bible. The primary objective of the academy is the training up of the student in the Christian life as presented in the Holy Bible while providing them a thorough education which will prepare them for college and life.

Since the primary reason for the existence of the school is spiritual and ministry related, efforts are made to bring all students to a saving faith in Jesus Christ. This will enable the student to have a firm and eternal foundation upon which to build the spiritual truths he is taught in the academy and in the Holy Bible. Instruction in right thinking, good conduct, and clean living will also be a part of the educational process.

Our academic standards have been developed to provide our students with the best possible program of study. Throughout the year, and with each passing subject, there is an emphasis on mastering the basics of all learning. We understand the needs of children are fairly the same, while also admitting the fact that not all children have the same abilities. We will do all that we can to assist these children in their academic requirements as needed. However, we will also expect each student to do his best. So doing builds character, discipline, and a sense of accomplishment. These positives the student will carry with him into his adult life.

Character training is an important element within the academy. The heart of character is obedience (deciding to do right), which will eventually cultivate an inner self-discipline, and is essential to the emotional, physical, social, and spiritual success of the student. Discipline is required in education and development. All discipline shall be administered fairly, but firmly with this goal in mind. To obey, to do right, to love God and Country, and to live the Christian life according to God's Word are characteristics we strive to instill in each student, thus equipping them for their role in God's plan for their life and for their place in society.

Like the church from whence it comes, LaRue Baptist Academy is distinctively Baptist in its theology and practice. We do not allow students or parents to introduce false doctrines (or unbiblical interpretations) in an attempt to influence students or faculty in the areas of charismatic beliefs (such as speaking in tongues, baptism of the Holy Spirit after conversion, the faith healing movement, etc.), or Roman Catholic beliefs (such as papal authority, purgatory, the magisterium etc.). Students who come out of non-Baptist churches are welcome to receive an education through our academy so long as they understand who we are and what our requirements shall be.

Related to the school's philosophy and purpose is the matter of parent-student cooperation. Full cooperation from both parent and student is expected. If at any time the administration of the academy believes that this cooperation is lacking, the student may be dismissed from the academy. Also, if the student's behavior or attitude indicates an uncooperative spirit or one that is out of harmony with the spirit of the academy, whether or not there is any definite breach of conduct, he may be dismissed.

Confession of Faith

We believe in the inspiration and authority of Holy Bible.

We believe that the Bible reveals God, the fall of man, the way of salvation, and God's purpose in the ages.

We believe in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

We believe in the deity of Christ, His virgin birth, sinless life, teaching and ethics, crucifixion and death, resurrection, and ascension into Heaven.

We believe that salvation is by grace through faith; plus nothing, minus nothing, mixed with nothing. The conditions to salvation are repentance and faith.

We believe that men are justified by faith alone and are accounted righteous before God only through the merit of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We believe in the return of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the everlasting conscious blessedness of the saved, and the everlasting conscious punishment of the lost.

Academic Information

Students are expected to put forth their best effort in and out of class. We use a variety of methods and curriculum to enhance our classes. Each student will be given both group and individual attention in the classroom, and extra help is available when necessary.

Honor Rolls: At the end of each quarter, students may be placed on one of the following honor rolls:

President's Honor Roll – "A's" in all subjects.

Honor Roll – "A's" and "B's" in all subjects.

Homework: Except for unusual circumstances or upper level subjects, homework will not be given on Wednesdays. This will enable students and parents to participate in their church's Wednesday evening service without feeling hurried or burdened by any homework. However, homework is an integral part of the school program, and each teacher is at liberty to give homework to students in order to aid and advance their studies. Therefore, each student is required to complete his homework assignments. We do request and expect parents' full cooperation in seeing that the assignments are completed. Repeated delinquent homework could result in a student's expulsion. Homework is given for the following reasons:

1. For preparation. Students profit most from classroom explanation and discussion when preparatory reading assignments are complete.
2. For practice. Following classroom explanation and illustration, homework is given so material will be mastered. Practice makes perfect.
3. For remedial activity. As instruction progresses, various weak points in a student's grasp of a subject become evident. Homework following instruction may be given to overcome such weakness or difficulties.
4. For special projects. Book reports, compositions, special research assignments, and projects are other reasons as to why homework is necessary.

Grades and Report Cards: At the end of each quarter, report cards are sent via email. Report cards must be signed, dated, and sent back accordingly each time. In order for a student to be promoted throughout Kindergarten and the 8th Grade, the averaged grades for all academic subject must be passing. If a student fails two or more subjects, he will be retained. If a student receives a failing grade in any subject, he will be required to take tutoring agreed upon by the administration. Tutoring will include at least twelve hours of instructional time per student. Tutoring may be available through the academy at an additional charge of \$15/hr. Students who fail grades between 9th-12th will have to repeat the class.

Discipline

Appropriate rules and guidelines should be looked upon as beneficial for the academy and the student. Rules help us (1) protect the general well being of our students, (2) prohibit the spread of known sin, (3) promote self-discipline and standards of excellence in mental, spiritual, and physical activities. LaRue Baptist Academy believes in the biblical teachings in regards to authority, rules, and obedience.

"What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). Although this is not the only passage of Scripture dealing with this subject, it still presents a compelling message. We are not our own. We are the Lord's. Our manner of life matters to God.

Believing that discipline is necessary for the welfare of school and student, each teacher is given the responsibility of making and enforcing classroom regulations in accordance with the school and the Scriptures. When misconduct occurs, corrective measures will be used to help the student change his behavior and attitude. Sometimes this takes place in the classroom, in a student-teacher conference, in a parent-teacher conference, demerits, detention, or a meeting with the principal. When demerits accumulate and become excessive, suspension or expulsion can result.

The Results of Demerits: The ideal result is that the student conforms and obeys, which will lead to success, joy, and productivity. When a student receives demerits in a semester this is what happens:

10 Demerits	1 day detention
20 Demerits	1 week detention
30 Demerits	1 additional week of detention
40 Demerits	1 day suspension
50 Demerits	Probation for the following semester
60 Demerits	2 day suspension
75 Demerits	Expulsion

The Reasons for Demerits: Demerits are for the purpose of warning a child of some behavior that is not desired and needs to change, but, if not changed, will lead to further discipline. Certain offences could result in suspension or expulsion. The following list will help teachers, students, and parents understand why a child has been issued demerits:

The Reasons for Detention: In some cases detention will mean in-school detention. In others, after-school detention. After-school detention will be from 3:10 – 4:00 PM. Students will be given work that must be completed during that detention time. No regular schoolwork or projects may be done during this time. A notice for detention will be sent home to the parents and will include the date that the detention will be served. Detention naturally inhibits a student from attending extra-curricular activities. If a student misses or skips a detention, he will receive two detentions for each one that is missed. Due to increased staffing after school hours, parents will be charged \$10 per detention.

The Reasons for Expulsion: The school cannot tolerate the behaviors listed below. Students who do these things will be dismissed from the school immediately.

- Vandalism of school or church property
- Fornication
- Homosexuality
- Striking or attempting to strike/harm a faculty member
- Mothering or fathering an illegitimate child
- Drinking alcohol or coming to school intoxicated
- Using, possessing, transferring, or pushing narcotics
- Any involvement in witchcraft or the occult
- Bringing or possessing any kind of weapon that fires a projectile
- Direct disobedience or disrespect

Dress Code

School uniforms are to be worn during school hours. The benefits of uniforms are as follows:

- ✓ Academic discipline. A higher discipline in dress results counts toward academic discipline
- ✓ Modesty. Uniforms eliminate indecency, immodesty, or slovenly dress.
- ✓ Unity. When all students are in like order, there is less potential for competition in dress.
- ✓ Image. Dress standards give the school a good image in the community and impacts a child's perspective on his personal self-image while enhancing his internal values.
- ✓ Price reduction. In some cases, parent's save money throughout the year when purchasing school uniforms for their children.

All clothing must be clean, in good repair, and well-pressed. Socks must match and be worn at all times. Boys especially are to have their hair cut above the eyebrows, no long side burns, no mullets, and no non-traditional styles (such as mohawk) or colors are allowed. Students must be clean shaven at all times (no beards or mustaches). Necklaces, chains, bracelets, earrings, or body piercing is not allowed. Belts must be worn with uniform.

Ladies must follow similar policy: no unnaturally tight, short, or long clothing is allowed. Hair must be clean and neat. If bangs are not pulled back, they cannot be dropping over the eyes. Fingernail polish cannot be dark. The length of dresses or skirts must be at the knee when standing. Pants or shorts are forbidden except when stated otherwise. Earrings are permitted unless they are a distraction to the learning experience of students. Please keep earrings of a feminine, modest style. Excessive earring styles or piercings are not allowed.

No hats, non-traditional hair colors (boys are not allowed to change their hair color), shirts must be tucked in at all times, no tattoos or drawings on a student's body. The school reserves the right to implement and adjust dress standards as desired.

Children in Pre-k through 6th grade may wear tennis shoes.

Tuition payments are due on the first day of the month. When the 1st falls on a Saturday or Sunday, payments may be made on Monday without being considered late. Tuition paid after the 10th day of the month will be charged a \$25.00 late fee.

LBA offers two payment options, a ten month plan and a twelve month plan. The ten month plan is calculated by dividing the total tuition cost by ten. This amount will be due for ten consecutive months beginning on August 1st with the last tuition payment being made on May 1st. The twelve month plan is calculated by dividing the total tuition cost by twelve. This amount will be due for twelve consecutive months beginning before the start of the school year on June 1st with the last payment being made on May 1st.

Because LBA is a ministry of LaRue Baptist Church, it is financially supported in part by the church. Because the tithing members of the church are already financially contributing to the academy through their tithes and offerings, the tuition rates are slightly lower for the faithful, tithing members of LaRue Baptist Church. This "church members discount" is dependent upon a family's continual and faithful support to LaRue Baptist Church by their attendance, involvement in ministry, and tithing.

Students must have a zero balance on their account before any quarterly tests can be taken. Any student who does not have a zero balance before the quarterly tests will be financially withdrawn and unable to take any tests. A student may forfeit the right to attend LaRue Baptist Academy if their account becomes more than three months delinquent.

LaRue Baptist Academy is ministry of LaRue Baptist Church. It does not receive any federal, state, or local, government assistance (other than tax-exempt status), and it is not endowed or supported by any other organization.

Academic Fee (\$300.00)

The Academic Fee includes the cost of teacher's curriculum, student books, standardized achievement tests, yearbooks, the student-school management system, and other miscellaneous charges related to academics. The cost of this fee is \$300 for all students (Pre-K – 12th). Because this fee in large part covers the cost of the student's books, it is necessary for it to be collected by the beginning of the school year. The due date for the academic fee is due upon enrollment or three weeks before the start of school so that student materials can be ordered in time. If the due date of this fee causes financial difficulties upon a family with multiple children, please contact the school office so that alternate payment dates can be arranged or financial assistance can be applied.

Registration Fee (\$100.00)

The registration fee is \$100 per family. If you have one, two, three, four, or more children enrolling (registering) in the school a one-time registration fee is all that is required per family at the beginning of each school year.

NOTE: As the school develops, more extra-curricular programs will be added (music program, art program, athletics program, etc.). Fees will be required for these programs as they are incorporated into the total school program.

Health Requirements

All students enrolling in LaRue Baptist Academy must have a health physical before entering Kindergarten and the 6th Grade. A completed health physical form must be turned in to the school office no later than the end of the first quarter of school. If it is not turned in, the student will not be allowed to come back to school for the second quarter until the form is on file at the school.

All students enrolling in LaRue Baptist Academy must have on file a copy of their current Kentucky State Immunization Certificate. Immunizations are given to children before entering Kindergarten and the 6th Grade. An immunization certificate must be turned in to the school office no later than the end of the first quarter of school. If it is not turned in, the student will not be allowed to come back to school for the second quarter until the form is on file at the school.

All students playing sports at LaRue Baptist Academy must have a Sports Physical, and the Sports Physical Form needs to be turned in before practices begin.

General Information

Admissions Policy: All decisions for admission to attend LaRue Baptist Academy are based on a formal application and interview. This interview is designed to determine if LBA can meet the needs of an individual student and family, and if a student is prepared to be successful at LBA.

Absences: In case of absence, the day the student returns, the parent should send a dated note to the office explaining the reason for the absence. An absence is excused for the following reasons: sickness or death in the family. Examples of unexcused absences include, but are not limited to, the following: oversleeping, out late the night before, working, leisure trips, needed at home, etc. In rare instances, a student may receive an excused absence for travel or family events. However, this must be approved by the principal in writing no less than one week in advance. If approved, the excused absence will not exceed three days and all work must be complete before the absence. Unexcused absences will result in the student receiving a zero in the daily grade of all classes missed; however, the student is required to make up any work that was to be completed in that class time as directed by the teacher.

If a student arrives at school after 10:00 AM, without a doctor's note, that student will be counted absent for one-half day. If a student leaves school before 2:30 PM, without pre-approval (written permission from the principal's office), that student will also be counted absent one-half day.

If a student knows ahead of time that he will need to miss school, he must fill out a pre-approval planned absence form. All work will need to be made up prior to the absence. Any work not turned in prior to leaving for this planned absence will be awarded a zero and must be made up.

Any student that has ten or more total absences in a single semester may lose all credit for that semester. Any student that has five or more unexcused absences in a single semester may be asked not to return the following semester.

Tardies: Students arriving after 8:00 AM are considered tardy, and must report to the school office. Requests for excused tardies must be received by the school office no later than the day following the tardy. The accumulation of three unexcused tardies in a semester will result in an unexcused absence. Students will receive three demerits for their third unexcused tardy and five demerits for each subsequent unexcused tardy during a quarter. An accumulation of ten or more unexcused tardies in a semester will result in a meeting with the principal.

Arrival and Dismissal: Normal school hours are from 8:00 AM – 3:00 PM. As a convenience to parents, early stay begins at 7:30 each morning. Students arriving at school between 7:30 AM – 7:50 AM must wait in lunchroom until their teacher opens the classroom. These early arrivers are not to wander about, but remain seated in the lunchroom until their teacher opens the classroom. Parents should pick up their students by 3:15 PM. Dismissal will take place in front of the church building, and as directed by the school staff. Parents are encouraged to use the convenience of the pick-up line. If a parent wishes to park their vehicle, enter the school office, and have their child picked up at the office building that is also allowed. Contact the school office for information about school aftercare.

Incomplete Work: A student has the number of days he missed plus one to make up work after an excused absence. If the work is not made up within this time frame, he will receive and "F."

Sickness: Students will not be permitted to attend school with a fever. Students must be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school. While school attendance is vitally important for every student, the health of all students and teachers is paramount.

Student-Driver Policy: If a student-driver wishes to drive himself to school, he must first contact the school office for student-driver policy information.

Inclement Weather Conditions: School closing announcements will be made by 6:30 AM and will be broadcasted through social media, texts, and all-call (phone call). Please do not assume that LBA will close because the local public schools close.

Bible: All students will be required to have a King James Bible, and use only the King James Bible in their assignments.

Cell Phones and Smart Devices: No cell-phones or smart devices (e.g. smart watches) allowed during school hours. Students may turn in said devices at the beginning of school and then pick them up after school before leaving for the day. If said devices are found, they will be confiscated and applicable demerits will be issued.

Anti-Harrassment Policy: It is essential to the well-being of all students that they be treated with due respect for their rights, individuality, and personal dignity. Therefore, it is the school's policy to prohibit all kinds of harassment. The work and learning environment requisite to the educational program must be one in which all individuals are free to develop relationships, work, and learn without fear of unacceptable behavior from another. It is the right of any person to protest this infringement in order that the offending action may be dealt with appropriately. If a complaint is substantiated, warning, suspension, or termination from school (student or teacher) could result.

Student Involvement: It is expected that parents and students (in whichever case) participate in and attend school functions (e.g. orientations, graduation, school programs, activities, parent-teacher fellowships, school functions, etc.).

Suspension: A student who has been suspended from school is responsible to complete all work that was missed. If the student missed a quiz, test, or exam he will receive a zero.

Telephone: Students are not allowed to use the school telephone during school hours unless for emergency calls.

Transfer Students: Students who are transferring from other schools will be expected to take an entrance examination. If the student's accomplishments (as shown by the examination) are on the grade level to which he has been promoted, he will then be recommended to that grade. However, if the student's accomplishments (as shown by the examination) are on a lower level, then he will be recommended to the grade suited to him. Students whose work is not satisfactory may be asked to transfer out. If a student's level of academic knowledge is far below the acceptable level he may be refused admission.

Medication: If a student is to take any medication while at school, he must have on file in the office an Authorization for Medical Administration form. This form is available in this school office. All medication to be dispensed will be kept in the school office and dispensed according to the doctor's instructions. Medicine must be properly labeled.

Re-enrollment: Beginning in March, re-enrollments for the fall term for present students are accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Discrimination: LBA admits students of any race, color, and national or ethnic origin to all rights, privileges, programs, and activities of the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, and national or ethnic origin in its administration of education policies, admission, or school programs. Racial slurs and other derogatory language will not be tolerated whatsoever.

Lost and Found: If an item has not been claimed within 14 days it will be disposed of properly.

Communicable Diseases: Defined as, "an illness that arises as a result of a specific infectious agent that may be transmitted whether directly or indirectly by a susceptible host or infected person or animal to other persons." A teacher or administrative who reasonably suspects that a student or employee has a communicable disease shall immediately notify the school principal and established protocols will be followed to control and prevent the spread of any communicable disease. Any student or employee with a communicable disease, for which immunization is required by law or is available, shall be temporarily excluded from school while ill and during recognized periods of communicability. If immunization is not available, the student or employee will be indefinitely excluded from school. If the nature of disease and circumstance warrant, LBA may require an independent physician's examination of the student or employee to verify the diagnosis of the communicable disease. LBA reserves the right to make all final decisions necessary to enforce its communicable disease policy and to take all necessary action to control the spread of communicable disease within the school.

Health Examination and Immunization Record: The Kentucky State Department of Health and Welfare may require the school to have certain forms on file for each of its students. The school will provide this information to parents and students. Failure to comply could result in expulsion.

Lunch: Proper nutrition is important for growth and learning. We encourage students to eat a good lunch every day. Students must bring a packed lunch each day of school unless other options or special lunch items are offered. We recommend students bring a ready-to-eat, healthy, balanced lunch. We encourage parents or family to visit during this time so long as they visit the school office first. Students will be given 30 minutes for lunch-time.

Withdrawals: All withdrawals must go through the school office. Students that attend one day of any month will owe the full month's tuition. In the event that the account is showing a credit balance at the time of withdrawal, this amount will be refunded. No school records will be released for any student when there is a balance owing on the student's account.
